
Cell shape: When cell changes its shape, what's going on inside?



Lecturer: Prof. Kohji TAKEI Graduate School of Medicine. Dentistry and Pharmaceutical Sciences, Okayama University


Dr. Takei was appointed in 1999 as the professor of Department of Biochemistry at Okayama University Medical School. He received Ph.D.

in Pathology in 1989 from Tokyo Dental Collage, and expanded his expertise in Cell Biology as Postdoctoral Associate, and then as Associate Research Scientist at Yale University School of Medicine. His contribution includes elucidation of molecular mechanisms of membrane traffic in the cell.

Professor Dr. Yoichi Nishimoto is currently working at the School of Humanities, Kanazawa University, Japan. He graduated from Chiang Mai University (MA in Social Development) and from Tokyo University (PhD in cultural anthropology). He specializes in cultural anthropology and has conducted fieldwork with Lahu people, a highland-dwelling ethnic

minority, in the area from northern Thailand and Yunnan, China.

Besides, he studies Thai Buddhist practices and Japanese society from the viewpoint of comparative research.
